




Legislative Session







2025 Legislative Session(s)



Session A – called by the Governor seeking immigration legislation. Dismissed by the Legislature.



Session B – called by the Legislature. Passed an immigration bill. Governor refused to sign.



2025 Legislative Session(s)




Session C – called by the Legislature. Passed an immigration bill. Governor signed.



Regular Session – extended to June 6 to deal with 3 different tax reduction scenarios.

Agreement in principle rescinded when Governor proposed to veto any sales tax relief.





Bills - Bills - and More Bills



2025 regular session included:

- 1,982 Bills & Proposed Committee Bills filed
- 1,906 Amendments filed
- 2,913 Votes Taken
- 255 Bills passed both chambers
- 0 Bills vetoed by the Governor*

Only 1 bill is constitutionally required to be approved....
*as of 5/20/25



Bills Impacting the SUS



- SB 584 Prioritizes housing for young adults who are/were in foster care and those experiencing homelessness.
- HB 1445 Board of Trustees and Board of Governors members must reside in Florida or have graduated from a state university.
- SB 768 Prohibits genetic sequencing software from foreign countries of concern in state laboratories.
- SB 892 Establishes the Florida State University Election Law Center withing the FSU College of Law.
- SB 118 Preempts local regulation of presidential libraries by deferring oversight to the federal government.
- HB 549 Requires state agencies to update maps and other geographic materials to reflect the Gulf of America.



Legislative Budget Process





- Legislative Budget Requests are submitted to the Governor, Senate & House of Representatives
- Governor submits budget recommendations to Senate & House of Representatives
- Senate & House budget committees hold public meetings to workshop budget issues
- Senate & House each pass their own budget bills (General Appropriations Act)
- House & Senate members hold public meetings to work out the differences between the budgets (a.k.a Budget Conference)
- A final General Appropriations Act is passed by the Senate & House
- The final budget is then sent to the Governor who has line item veto power

Long Range Financial Outlook




The Long-Range Financial Outlook (Outlook) is issued annually by the Legislative Budget Commission as required by article III, section 19(c)(1) of the Florida Constitution. The Outlook provides a longer-range picture of the state's fiscal position that integrates expenditure projections for the major programs driving Florida's annual budget requirements with the latest official revenue estimates.




Collects & distributes income from faculty billings for patient services performed at medical schools or clinics




Operating Appropriations and LBR (in billions)






Fixed Capital Outlay Appropriations (in millions)






Higher Education Tuition per FTE Student Four-Year Public Institutions

C. In the Middle



Performance-based Funding Model



History:

- 2007 and prior Universities funded based on enrollment
- 2012 Governor Rick Scott and elected leaders charged the Board of Governors with creating a performance-based funding model
- January 2014 Board approved a 10-metric model under Board of Governors Chair Hosseini's Leadership

Four Guiding Principles:

Use metrics that align with the System's Strategic Plan goals

Reward Excellence or Improvement Have a few clear, simple metrics

Acknowledge the unique mission of each institution

Performance-based Funding Model



Key Components of the Model:

- Institutions will be evaluated on either Excellence or Improvement
- Maximum score is 100 points.
- Data is based on one year.
- No weighting of any metric.
- The benchmarks for Excellence were based on the Board of Governors 2025 System Strategic Plan goals and analysis of relevant data trends, whereas the benchmarks for Improvement were determined after reviewing data trends for each metric.
- Universities declining 2 years in a row must do a student success plan.
- Universities scoring below 70 must do a student success plan and only receive 50% of their state investment.
- The Florida Legislature and Governor determine the amount of <u>new</u> state funding and the amount of institutional base funding that is at risk.











Performance-based Metric Improvement Degrees and Cost to the Student








Metric 8a: Percent of Graduate Degrees Awarded in Programs of Strategic Emphasis
